About the Map

This pathway meets requirements for the Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) in International Business. This regionally-accredited BAS degree focuses on providing hands-on experiences and incorporating job-related skills into the classroom. The IB BAS degree works with industry partners to bring real projects into the classroom and frequently incorporates local industry leaders as guest speakers and in panels. Completion of this degree opens doors to careers and advancement in marketing, operations, leadership, accounting, entrepreneurship, finance, project management, logistics, and information systems. It also allows you to continue to a master's degree.

BAS degrees are considered career preparation degrees and are specifically designed to build on a variety of prior academic and life experiences such as military training, transfer and non-transfer associate degrees, and international degrees. Additionally, the IB BAS program can accept credits from past colleges and universities to continue your education.

Students in this pathway develop skills in business management, leadership, public speaking, multicultural awareness, team communication and collaboration, computer and technical literacy, and research and analysis in economics, statistics, and politics. Competencies in these areas consistently rank at the top of employer wish lists.

Many students use this program to leverage their current jobs into advanced career opportunities.

Apply for Financial Aid and Other Funding

You do not need to be a full-time student to receive financial aid funds.

Which quarter can I begin?

This program has a new group of students (cohort) every fall quarter. Students who do not meet the prerequisites to enter in the fall should meet with a BAS advisor to discuss alternative admission options. Students can apply early to reserve their space in future cohorts while completing prerequisites and other general education requirements.

Length of Program

90 credits = 9 quarters if you take 10 credits* each term.

*Students who take 15 credits each quarter earn their degree faster, qualify for more financial aid, and earn more money over their lifetime because they complete their schooling faster.

Class Times/Delivery Format?

300 and 400 level courses are offered fully online or as hybrids (each class meets one evening per week on-campus, Monday-Thursday, and online). Prerequisite and general education courses are offered on-campus in the day, evenings, online, or hybrid (part on-campus, part online), and occasional Saturdays. Check the class schedule for the latest offerings.

Future Education Opportunities

This degree is a regionally-accredited bachelor's degree in Business that qualifies students to move on to advanced master's programs. Program and admissions requirements vary from college-to-college.

The IB BAS program has established Master of Business Administration (MBA) pathways with Seattle Pacific University, City University, Western Governors University, and Central Washington University's ITAM program. Alumni have gone on to several different university MBA programs and professional programs in Supply Chain Management, Communications, and Accounting. Students are qualified to compete for entry into programs at institutions such as the University of Washington, Washington State University, Seattle University, and others."
