Once you complete this Associate degree, additional educational opportunities include, but are not limited to:

- A Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) degree at one of the Seattle Colleges.

Get Started

Step 1: Apply and register at North Seattle College anytime (the application is always free). Once you become a student, register for classes using the online class schedule and go to the academic calendar for registration dates and tuition deadlines.

Step 2: See an advisor to create a personalized educational plan by the end of your second quarter. Your plan will include prerequisites, graduation requirements, and transfer preparation if you plan to transfer to another college or university to earn a bachelor's degree.

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Before Quarter One

- Pre-College or Transitional Studies Math (if needed)
- Pre-College or Transitional Studies English (if needed)
- Apply for <u>Financial Aid</u> and other funding before your first quarter. Visit the <u>Financial Aid Office</u> to explore how to pay for college.
- Transfer previous college credits to North if applicable.
- Attend New Student Orientation.
- Explore placement options: take the math and English placement tool if needed.
- Make an informed choice on the number of units to take each quarter.
- F-1 international students must enroll full time (12+ units) each quarter and check in with the <u>International Programs</u> office before the start of the quarter if enrolling in less than 12 units and/or before starting any work or volunteer experience.
- If you need academic accommodations for a documented disability, please contact Disability Services.

Sample Quarterly To-Do List

This is an example of a quarterly to-do list:

Quarter 1

- Schedule an appointment with your assigned advisor in <u>Starfish</u> to meet and discuss your goals. Learn more about Starfish here.
- Document all work made in class every quarter.
- Apply for Student Art Sale in early November.
- Explore careers and majors through workshops, counseling, and career services.
- Come to the <u>Library</u> to get help with research; check out resources; access computers and study space; and create media projects.
- Visit the <u>Student Learning Center</u> to learn about tutoring services offered in-person and online.
- Check out <u>campus life</u>: Art Group, <u>Art Gallery</u>, <u>Student Clubs and Affinity Groups</u>, <u>TRIO</u>, <u>Equity & Welcome</u>
 Center, Wellness Center, etc.

Quarter 2

- Create an educational plan with your assigned advisor.
- Apply for <u>financial aid</u> for the upcoming academic year in Winter or Spring quarter to maximize your funding options.
- Research and develop a list of four-year colleges and universities.
- Attend <u>transfer events</u> at North and universities of interest.
- Visit North's Transfer webpage for transfer information.
- Let your faculty know that you are pursuing the Associate of Fine Arts.
- Apply for Licton Springs Review by January 31 and League for Innovation in March.
- Attend campus lectures/forums from the Arts, Humanities & Social Sciences division.

Quarter 3

- Update your <u>educational plan</u> with your <u>assigned</u> advisor.
- Apply for summer financial aid.
- Apply for Juried Student Show and Spring Art Sale in late April/early May.
- Talk with your Arts, Design & Graphics academic advisor about summer electives.
- Visit potential universities and determine application deadlines.
- Apply for the <u>Seattle Colleges Foundation Scholarship</u> and <u>other scholarships</u>. Art specific scholarships are available.
- Consider <u>Student Leadership positions</u> and other <u>on-campus jobs</u> such as work study opportunities in the NSC Art Gallery and the Ceramics studio.
- Attend "Making Learning and Teaching Visible" campus event every spring.

Quarter 4

- Document all work made in class every quarter.
- Visit potential universities and determine application deadlines.
- Summer quarter is recommended but not required.
 Please see financial aid about your summer funding options and your assigned advisor for summer course options.
- If you take ART 255 in quarter four, you should not take ART 253 or 251 in quarter six.

Quarter 5

- Update your educational plan and confirm your program of study with your assigned advisor.
- Contact art departments at potential universities.
- Write your personal statement for university applications.
- Attend National Portfolio Day in early November.

Quarter 6

- Apply for the AFA degree in ctcLink. Check with your assigned advisor to be sure you are meeting degree requirements.
- Contact Art department coordinator to start your portfolio process at the beginning of the quarter.
- Visit the Student Learning Center for help with your artist statement and resume.
- Apply for <u>financial aid</u> for the upcoming academic year in Winter or Spring quarter to maximize your funding options.
- · Apply to universities or colleges and scholarships.
- ART 251 is only required if you did not take ART 255 in summer quarter.

Quarter 7

- Check in with university for transfer plan.
- Fine-tune your portfolio, artist statement, and CV with your faculty portfolio advisors and resume.
- Complete portfolio requirements.
- Turn in two copies of your physical portfolio and one digital copy on a thumb drive.
- Order cap and gown for commencement and join alumni association.
- Attend on-campus graduation fair and commencement ceremony.



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
